He has used his voice to reflect on 'care for creation,' in his many statements on Earth Day and World Water Day over the years!

In his encyclical *Laudato Si'– On Care for Our Common Home* (2015), Pope Francis wrote, "Whether believers or not, we are agreed today that the earth is essentially a shared inheritance, whose fruits are meant to benefit everyone. For believers, this becomes a question of fidelity to the Creator, since God created the world for everyone. Hence, every ecological approach needs to incorporate a social perspective which takes into account the fundamental rights of the poor and the underprivileged."

The COVID 19 epidemic has shown that our lives and actions are inextricably linked to those around us, including the environment. The seven-year *Laudato Si'* Action Platform offers a fresh opportunity for each of us to commit to complete sustainability in the spirit of *Laudato Si*. 

- **Encourage Carpooling** One way that Catholics can continue to respond positively to *Laudato Si* is by sharing rides to Sunday Mass, school, and parish events.
- **EV Car Charging Station** Parishes and schools can encourage parishioners, teachers, and students to drive electric cars to work and church by installing a few charging station.
- **Parking for Hybrid Cars** parishes could set aside a row of spaces reserved for parishioners, students, and teachers who drive hybrid, electric, or alternative-fueled vehicles.
- **Alternatives to Driving** use public transportation such as buses or subways, simply walk or bike, join a bike sharing program, or try ride sharing or car sharing services
- Plan a Vacation that Emits a Smaller Carbon Footprint

Breathing Life into Pollinator Garden @ La Vista

This garden was created in response to the disappearing monarch butterfly. It, along with many other pollinators, are endangered by use of pesticides and reduction in habitat.
